PE and Sports Funding Impact 2020 – 2021

Redesdale Primary School has utilised its PE and Sports Grant this year to ensure children receive the effective teaching of a newly developed high-quality PE curriculum and the development of new sporting and playtime opportunities. This has increased the children's interest and engagement with the PE curriculum, a range of new sports and supported the work of our Primary Leaders. We feel it is essential to encourage children to become involved in sports and physical activities, as well as participating in enrichment activities and participating in intra and inter school competitions, although this has been very challenging during the COVID pandemic.

The data for the table below is up to Friday 13th March 2020 as this is the last week enrichment clubs took place due to the Coronavirus school closures. The data for 2018-19 has been revised to the equivalent week so that the data shows a fairer comparison. No after school clubs have been able to take place during the last year and we hope the new academic year will see the return of many activities and continue the projects which we have initiated during the pandemic.

Outline of Expenditure	Cost	Impact of 2020 - 2021 spending
Development of Woodland Area and Orienteering Course	£2,378	The first phase of the Woodland area has been cleared by professional tree services, staff and a consultant has helped us to create a willow entrance area with seats, which then opens out into the area which has been cleared and bark added. The area is to be risk assessed and a whole school timetable set up from the start of the academic year so that all key stages are accessing and using this new resource for cross curricular activities. Further improvements will be made in stage 2 of this project next year.
Skipping ropes for all KS2 classes	£540	All classes in Key Stage 2 have class sets of skipping ropes for active play times to increase activity during and after the pandemic. Children engaging in more active play times to help some children in particular to begin to feel better about themselves after gaining weight during lockdown.
CPD Tennis, Cycling and Orienteering	£500	Two members for staff have received tennis coaching from a level 4 qualified coach. Two other members of staff have received orienteering training after this was set up. Three members of staff have received training from the British Cycling Association to take groups of children out cycling with Bike4Health.
Equipment to improve Curriculum and Enrichment Activities.	£1,921	New bibs have been purchased for Key Stage 2 with a comfier fit. New tennis balls for tennis lessons and new footballs to replace damaged balls during lockdown. After asking all children what improvements they would like to see in the yard, two new outdoor basketball nets have been set up and are being built ready to go out in September. New Samba goals have been purchased for outdoors to continue developing sportsmanship and ball skills outdoors.
Cycling Initiative Project	£12,011	A storage unit fitted with racking to hold the 24 Frog bikes (3 different sizes) 26 helmets and accessories to cater for children in Years 4,5,6.
Delivery of Cycling Initiative	£3,917	Using a local cycling provider Bike4Health 2 instructors and members of staff have taken part in weekly cycle routes with children in years 4,5 and 6. This year 89 children have taken part in the initiative to improve their confidence and self-esteem. 5 children have learnt to

		ride a bike within school and then joined their peers on a cycle ride. Some children have asked their parents for a bike at home. The feedback has been fantastic from the children and 100% of children are looking forward to taking part in the initiative next year.
PE Co-ordinator cover	£130	Co-ordinator development time was taken to attend online PE networking session and supply booked for class.
High Borans – Kayaking	£450	As the Year 6 children were unable to go to High Borans, we asked the High Borans team to come to a local lake for the children to experience the sport of kayaking which none of them had experienced before. The feedback from children was fantastic and that they would love to do more sport experiences like this outdoors.
Sports Week and Children's Cancer Run North	£390	All children in school were invited to take part in the Children's Cancer Run at school and everyone helped to raise £1,031 for the charity. Children completed 5 miles over the week, completing 1 mile a day. Access coaching came into school for 4 days with all children participating in new sports including rockitball, archery, tri-golf and ultimate dodgeball. These activities will link to future after school clubs which will run in September. Two trophies were presented by each class for their ABC'S champion which links to our school ethos on who had the best attitude, behaviour, commitment, and sportsmanship throughout the week.

School Swimming Outcomes 2020-21

As part of the requirements of the PE Funding we are required to report on the number of children who have met the national curriculum requirement to :-

- swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres
- use a range of strokes effectively
- perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situation

At Redesdale Primary School our children in Year 4 would normally attend a block swimming programme with pupils attending swimming one hour daily, for a four week period. Unfortunately, due to the coronavirus pandemic and consequent lockdowns swimming lessons were cancelled. We will liaise with our swimming providers to re-arrange when possible. For the current Year 6 class leaving Redesdale, the number of children who have met the national curriculum requirement is 22 children from a class of 30. (73.3%). Due to the pandemic we have been unable to target any children to increase this number.
