PE and Sports Funding Impact 2021 - 2022

Redesdale Primary School has utilised its PE and Sports Grant this year to ensure children receive the effective teaching of a newly developed high-quality PE curriculum and the development of new sporting and playtime opportunities. This has increased the children's interest and engagement with the PE curriculum, a range of new sports and supported the work of our Primary Leaders. We feel it is essential to encourage children to become involved in sports and physical activities, as well as participating in enrichment activities and participating in intra and inter school competitions, although this has been very challenging during the COVID pandemic.

After Covid many of our leaders had left school so we need to look at providing more time to developing quality leaders which then results in providing training and guidance to the next cohort of leaders, so that this becomes sustainable with minimal support. For the first time 59% of club hours were provided by staff, rather than external providers.

Children do not bring their own bikes in for cycling session so we can ensure we have spare inner tubes which are suitable for our bikes, as parents are not able to provide this for bikes from home. Our bikes will also be serviced annually to ensure they are reliable and ready to use.
